<b>Matter for Decision:</b>	As it was now twenty years since the Corn Exchange reopened following extensive refurbishment and parts of the building and fittings are now starting to look tired whilst the auditorium floor and bleacher seating require replacing on safety grounds. The project appraisal details work proposed for the summer of 2006 that will be funded from within Arts and Entertainments' current Repairs and Renewals provision (note that this is an approved scheme in the Capital Plan, approved by Council on 23 February 2006) Replacement of the tiered bleacher seating is the most expensive single upgrade at an estimated £70,000 and at such cost is a tender item.		
<b>Why the decision had to be made (and any alternative options):</b>	The foyer and bar lighting is 20 years old and the overall look of the venue could be enhanced to improve public perception if this were replaced. Similarly rooms require redecoration and it is sensible to do these at once as 'down time' is required to do any or all of this work.
