

# Policing and Safer Neighbourhoods Report Cambridge City North Neighbourhood

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### 1. Introduction

#### **Aim**

The aim of the Neighbourhood profile update is to provide an overview of action taken since the last reporting period, identify ongoing and emerging crime and disorder issues, and provide recommendations for future priorities and activity in order to facilitate effective policing and partnership working in the area.

The document should be used to inform Area Committee meetings, multi-agency neighbourhood action groups and neighbourhood policing teams, so that issues can be identified, effectively prioritised and partnership problem solving activity undertaken.

#### **Methodology**

This document was produced using the following data sources:

- Crime and Incident data, from June 09 – September 09 and as a comparison data from February 09 – May 09 and June 08 – September 08.
- Information from the Neighbourhood Policing teams, October 2009.
- Cambridge City Council, City Services' data, June – September 2009 and as a comparison data from the same period in 2008.

## 2. Previous Priorities & Engagement Activity

### Previous Priorities

At the Area Committee meeting on 02/07/2009 the following issues were adopted as priorities. The tables below summarise action taken and the current situation regarding the priorities which were set:

#### Vehicle Crime in Nuns Way

This plan was generated by the previous City North Area Committee where an increase in vehicle crime in the Kings Hedges ward was discussed in general terms based on the Neighbourhood Profile document produced for the group. The analysis was not of a requisite depth to consider the matter in detail but the matter adopted as a priority for City North for further consideration and action with due regard to Campkin Road and adjoining streets.

<b>Objective</b>	<p>The aim of this plan was to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Reduce the number of offences of theft from a motor vehicle recorded across Kings Hedges</li> <li>2. Promote partnership with the council security messages concerning vehicles utilising available leaflets through door-knocking in the Nuns Way area.</li> <li>3. Conduct a visual audit of the Nuns Way area with partners and local Councillors to seek to identify areas for environmental improvements to seek to prevent crime and aid apprehension. Where identified ensure implementation.</li> </ol>
<b>Action Taken</b>	<p>Analysis revealed that geographical hotspot of the offences was Nuns Way and adjacent streets.</p> <p>30 hours of dedicated patrol was conducted during the period at times identified as key to the commission of offences by local staff.</p> <p>Patrols were supplemented by the provision of crime prevention information door-to-door to seek to reduce the attraction to would-be thieves. The message was also communicated via e-cops.</p> <p>An “environmental audit” was conducted with Councillor Pitt that identified physical security and lighting issues that where improved could assist in the prevention of offences and make</p>

	the area less inviting to offenders.
<b>Current Situation</b>	There were no offences recorded in Nuns Way during the period compared to 4 in the previous. Across Kings Hedges 21 offences were recorded this period compared to 31 in the previous. There are no current patterns or trends in these recent offences.
<b>Continue or Discharge?</b>	Discharge

### **Criminal Damage in Arbury / Kings Hedges**

The previous North Area Committee noted a spike in offences of criminal damage in the Arbury and Kings Hedges Wards amongst an otherwise extremely positive crime recording period. This was also noted in the Neighbourhood Profile Document produced for that meeting, but limited analysis was completed.

<b>Objective</b>	<p>The aim of this plan was to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Ascertain key locations where offences of criminal damage are occurring.</li> <li>2. Identify the types of damage being experienced given the fairly inclusive classification.</li> <li>3. Consider and implement solutions in partnership aiming to prevent and detect offences</li> <li>4. Ultimately to seek a reduction in offences of criminal damage in the target area defined.</li> </ol>
<b>Action Taken</b>	<p>A comprehensive review of offences of criminal damage was undertaken by the County Council across the City. The Arbury / Kings Hedges area was identified as comparatively not a hot-spot area despite this spike.</p> <p>Lower level Police analysis determined that there was no particular pattern in offences. The criminal damage classification includes a wide range of public and private circumstances from damage in a house during a domestic incident to damage to a vehicle in a public space through drunken recklessness. The lack of a pattern makes both enforcement and prevention extremely difficult.</p> <p>The commission of offences was monitored throughout the</p>

	period seeking to identify a clear and actionable pattern. None emerged.
<b>Current Situation</b>	<p>During the period there was a reduction in offences in both Arbury and Kings Hedges, with recording levels in the former reducing by over half compared to the previous period.</p> <p>Criminal Damage is an issue remaining on the local agenda City-wide with further discussions scheduled to seek to identify options to tackle this wide-ranging crime type.</p>
<b>Continue or Discharge?</b>	Discharge.

### Development of CRC- Community Cohesion

Cambridge Regional College has recently closed its Newmarket Road campus and is further developing its Kings Hedges Road site. This is going to entail a considerable shift in student population to the latter campus, to the tune of 10,000 mainly 16 -20 year olds. With the warmer weather and the summer holiday period fast approaching, this significant demographic change in the North of Cambridge was agreed at the previous Area Committee as requiring careful monitoring concerning community impact.

<b>Objective</b>	<p>This plan aimed to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Ascertain the impact of the increased capacity of CRC on local shops, traders and residents and consider whether there may be factual / evidential basis for perceptions. Where identified consider ways to mitigate such impact.</li> <li>2. Seek innovative ways to engage with foreign students who may become both victims of crime and offenders of crime / ASB, seek to understand their anxieties and reinforce appropriate messages to then achieve this through renewed contact with pastoral leads in the CRC. If/where issues are identified considered ways to mitigate concerns.</li> </ol>
<b>Action Taken</b>	<p>Police have engaged both with those responsible for pastoral care and security of CRC students and estate. It was identified that the increase initially is of 500 additional students. New site facilities were viewed in anticipation of the new term.</p> <p>A meeting was held with local residents and traders and concerns identified and discussed. The main issue was of</p>

	<p>anti-social behaviour and littering outside Tesco linked to large numbers of CRC students using the store. Regular patrols by local Police staff and Council Teams concerning littering and anti-social behaviour have been carried out.</p> <p>A number of events were attended by local neighbourhood staff during the college's "fresher week", seeking to engage with new arrivals to the facility and in particular seek to identify any vulnerable groups.</p> <p>Feedback and discussion with pastoral staff have revealed no particular concerns at this time contrary to initial fears. Across the City, there has been a significant reduction in the recorded level of offences against overseas students, particularly violent crimes compared to previous years.</p> <p>At the point of half-term, feedback from the college is that the academic year to date has been less problematic compared to previous years despite the capacity increase.</p>
<b>Current Situation</b>	<p>There have been 12 calls for service to CRC in the period for a variety of reasons. There are no patterns in these calls and many have been information only and low level incidents. Although exceedingly difficult to assess, there are no obvious patterns in victimisation of young people or those from overseas residing and studying temporarily.</p> <p>Work continues with the Police Community Cohesion Unit to develop links with any groups in the college who could be under-represented or traditionally have limited engagement with Police and other service providers for a variety of reasons, as well as regular engagement with staff and students.</p>
<b>Continue or Discharge?</b>	<p>Continue.</p> <p>It remains early in the academic year and it is felt the continuation of this plan is necessary with a revised focus.</p>

### ***Engagement Activity***

**The Streets** - The Police, City Council, Fire Service and Drinksense are currently running a programme of anti-social behaviour workshops in schools within the City. The one day programme known as 'Streets' is aimed at educating years 8 and 9 about the causes and consequences of ASB. Participating schools include Manor, Parkside, Coleridge, Chesterton and St Bede's.

**Street Forums** - Over the summer the Tenants Federation organised Street Forums in the north of the city, areas included Kingsway, Mortlock &

Maitland, Edgecombe Street, Bermuda Terrace. Analysis of the findings are being co-ordinated by the tenants federation.

### **Cambridge wide priorities**

**Burglary of homes** – As part of the citywide dwelling burglary priority, all households in Roseford Road, St Albans Road and Martingale Close were visited and provided advice and information on Home Security and Fire Safety. SmartWater was also made available to households to allow them to property mark valuable items. As part of the event the Meadow Centre was used as a ‘hub’ where members of the public could attend and discuss issues of concern in their neighbourhood. All people spoken to were asked to complete a community safety questionnaire, the results of which were very positive about the area.

A similar event was held earlier this year in East Chesterton and a third is to be held in the Buchan Street area in November.

**Personal Robbery** – The youth service are running a specific project with young people identified as at risk of becoming involved in these type of offences. The youth service are holding one to one sessions with identified young people, group work and running diversionary activities.

**Cycle projects** – Work has taken place in September and October to raise awareness of both cycle security and cycle safety in the city. The campaigns have focussed on ‘lock it don’t lose it’ and promotion of [www.immobilise.com](http://www.immobilise.com) and also on the importance of having lights on your bike after dark in the city.

### **Police Surgeries**

Monthly “surgeries” continue at Arbury Court, permitting local residents to raise matters with their neighbourhood team in an informal setting.

### **Community Safety and Environmental Days**

The Cambridge Community Safety Partnership Burglary Task Group has scheduled “Community Safety and Environmental” days at five areas identified through historical analysis of burglary hotspots in the City.

These days involve face-to-face contacts with local residents providing information -tailored by street- on crime prevention and local activity.

Residents are also registered free with the “Smartwater” property marking system to help trace any stolen items and a questionnaire completed to better understand local concerns and feedback on public services.

In the region of 300 residences in St Alban's Road and vicinity were visited on 17<sup>th</sup> October.

Future dates in City North are:

- Buchan Street and vicinity – 14<sup>th</sup> Nov
- Alpha Road and vicinity – 20<sup>th</sup> Mar 2010
- Water Street and vicinity – 20<sup>th</sup> Feb 2010

### **3. Emerging Issues**

#### **Neighbourhood trends**

Total crime in City North has fallen considerably with 1089 offences reported over the 4 month period compared to 1309 offences in the previous period. Comparatively, there were 1484 offences reported in the same period last year which is the equivalent of a 27% reduction. Reductions were particularly noted in serious acquisitive crime (consisting of dwelling burglary offences, robbery and vehicle crime).

There has been an increase in anti-social behaviour (ASB) incident levels in City North with 1044 incidents reported over the 4 month period compared with 939 in the previous period. This is likely to be a seasonal trend linked to the summer holidays. Notably, however, ASB levels are still lower than those recorded for the same period last year.

#### **Arbury**

- Total crime in Arbury has continued to decline throughout this 4 month period with 281 offences reported compared with 363 in the previous period. Moreover, this is also much lower than the same period last year, with significantly low offence levels for the months of July, August and September 2009 (where monthly offence levels fall outside 1 standard deviation of the mean since April 2008).
- Dwelling burglary offences in Arbury have fallen considerably from 46 reported in the previous period to 24 in the latest 4 month period. The majority of these offences were clustered to the north of the ward in the residential areas surrounding Hazelwood/Molewood Close, Verulam Close and St. Andrews Road.
- Non-dwelling burglary offences have remained consistent with the previous period with 26 offences reported. In contrast to dwelling burglaries, the majority of non-dwelling offences tended to be clustered towards the South of the ward in the area of Victoria Road, Histon Road and the cemetery. Furthermore, there were a series of 8 non-dwelling burglaries which targeted the rooms of foreign students staying at Clare College within the first week of July.
- Vehicle crime in Arbury has been low compared to the previous period with only 12 thefts from vehicles reported. This represents a reduction of over 50% when compared to both the previous period and the same

period last year. Similarly, only 6 vehicles were reported stolen over the 4 month period compared to 18 in the previous period. Eight out of 12 vehicles broken into over the 4 month period were situated in a similar location to the non-dwelling burglaries which may suggest a link between the offence types in this area.

- Violent offences have increased to 66 offences reported during the 4 month period compared to 46 in the previous period. However, this is relatively consistent with the same period last year. No particular trends in offences could be identified.
- The number of ASB incidents in Arbury has increased (280 reported in the previous 4 month period and 297 in the latest period), but has remained much lower than the same period last year (352). Hotspot location for ASB include the area surrounding Histon Road (71 incidents) and Victoria Road (29). Thirty-four of the Histon Road incidents were youth-related, while the majority of the remaining incidents consisted of drunken and disorderly behaviour displayed in the area of the cemetery. Seventeen of the Victoria Road incidents were reported at the same location and were often alcohol related.
- Between June and September 2009 there were 19 reports of abandoned vehicles in the ward, compared with 27 during the same period last year. This included 7 vehicles, which were not on site following inspection. CLE26 notices were also issued to four offenders on behalf of the DVLA for not displaying road tax on a public highway and will result in fines issued by the DVLA. Five vehicles were also impounded on behalf of the DVLA for not having valid road tax. One vehicle was claimed following payment of a fine to the DVLA and the other four vehicles were destroyed. Another case has been referred to the Council's Housing department. Linden Close (5 reports) was a hotspot during this period. There were no specific hotspots during the 2008 period.
- Between June and September 2009 there were 90 fly tips within the ward, compared with 89 during the same period last year. All were removed within 24 hours with sufficient evidence to issue two warning letters. In addition, a caution and two verbal warnings were issued. Waste transfer documentation was also requested from three trade offenders. Brackley Close (9) and Stretten Avenue (8) were the particular hotspots during this period. In the 2008 period, Hazelwood Close (10) and Molewood Close (19) were particular hotspots.
- Between June and September 2009, 13 needles were removed. This was over two occasions at Histon Road Recreation Ground (5 in total)

and three occasions from Histon Road Cemetery (8 in total). During the same period the previous year, 9 needles were removed, primarily from Histon Road Cemetery.

- 36 derelict cycles were dealt with between June and September 2009, compared with 30 during the same period last year. French's Road (8) and Cockerell Road (4) were particular hotspots during this period. In the 2008 period Molewood Close (6) and Gilbert Road (3) were the hotspots.
- 3 items of graffiti were removed between June and September 2009 by the City Rangers, compared with 10 during the same period last year. Stretten Avenue was a hotspot for the period in 2008.

### **East Chesterton**

- A further reduction in total crime across the ward has been seen with 265 offences reported over the 4 month period. This is lower than the 302 reported in the previous period and much lower than the 438 reported in the same period last year.
- Reductions have been particularly seen in burglary offences and vehicle crime.
- Dwelling burglaries during the period have fallen to 19 reported over 4 months. Similarly to the previous update, these offences tended to be clustered around Scotland Road and the High Street and their neighbouring roads. The majority of these offences were overnight offences.
- Robbery offences have increased during the period to 8 reported compared to 5 in the previous period and the same period last year. Two of these offences were related to the Strawberry Fair in June where a group of offenders targeted two friends during the same incident. No further trends were identified in the remaining offences.
- Cycle theft in East Chesterton has increased in comparison to the previous period with 45 offences reported. However, this is fairly consistent with the previous period. Cycle theft follows a seasonal trend and is likely to increase in the upcoming months with the return of students to the city.
- ASB remains constant against the previous period (265 incidents reported) but is at a much lower level than that reported in the same 4

month period last year (350). Hotspot areas continue to be Scotland Road (28 incidents), High Street (21) and their adjoining roads. The majority of the incidents reported on Scotland Road were related to a group of youths causing problems for the shopkeepers and the residents in the area. Similar problems were reported on the High Street.

- Between June and September 2009 there were 16 reports of abandoned vehicles in the ward, compared with 18 during the same period last year. This included 11 vehicles, which were not on site following inspection. Three vehicles were also impounded on behalf of the DVLA for not having valid road tax. One vehicle was destroyed for non-payment of the fine and the other two vehicles are awaiting collection by their owners. Another vehicle was also destroyed after the owner could not be traced. Moss Bank (4 reports) was a hotspot during this period, whereas Mortlock Avenue was a hotspot (6 reports) during the 2008 period.
- Between June and September 2009 there were 67 reports of fly tipping within the ward, compared with 50 during the same period last year. All were removed within 24 hours and there was sufficient evidence to issue two warning letters and a caution. In addition, waste transfer documentation was requested from one trade offender and one case is currently pending further investigation. Church Street (12), Maitland Avenue (7) and Moss Bank (7) were the particular hotspots during this period and resulted in the simple caution and one of the formal warning letters being sent. In the 2008 period, Church Street (12), Maitland Avenue (4), Mortlock Avenue (3) and St Andrew's Road (3) were the hotspots.
- Between June and September 2009, 13 needles were removed. This was over two occasions at Histon Road Recreation Ground (5 in total) and three occasions from Histon Road Cemetery (8 in total). During the same period the previous year, 9 needles were removed, primarily from Histon Road Cemetery.
- 18 derelict cycles were dealt with between June and September 2009, compared with 32 during the same period last year. Dundee Close (3) was a hotspot during this period whereas Church Street (5) and Green End Road (3) were the hotspots during the 2008 period.
- Between June and September 2009, 68 needles were removed, compared to 54 during the same period last year. 6 needles were removed from or close to the public toilets in Church Street over three

occasions, whereas the vast majority (60) resulted from a one-off find at the top of a builder's skip in Church Street.

- 8 items of graffiti were removed between June and September 2009 by the City Rangers, compared with 1 item during the same period the last year. Chesterton High Street was a hotspot with 6 items removed from bus stops.
- **Kings Hedges**
- Total crime in Kings Hedges has increased during the 4 month period from 303 offences reported in the previous period to 350 in the current period. This is higher than during the same period last year.
- Dwelling burglary offences have fallen from 44 offences reported in the previous period to 32 in the current 4 month period. Offences were spread out across the ward, however, a small cluster of offences was noted to the north of the ward, in the area around Kings Hedges Road, Armitage Way/Arden Road, Northfields Avenue, Apollo Way and Buchan Street.
- Vehicle crime in Kings Hedges has fallen, with 21 vehicles broken into over the last 4 months compared to 31 in the previous period. These were all fairly spread out across the ward. In 5 of these offences, sets of index plates had been targeted and on 2 of these occasions the bumpers had also been removed. There were 2 offences reported in August where wheels were removed from 2 different vehicles within days of each other (4 wheels removed altogether). No more offences of this type have been reported so far. In addition, there were 2 offences where tax discs were stolen.
- There has been a reduction in robbery offences from 10 offences reported in the previous period to 4 reported during the latest 4 month period.
- Theft from shop offences remain consistent with the previous period but are almost double the level reported during the same period last year. However, it should be noted that offenders for 16 out of the 27 offences reported were arrested and charged with the offences.
- ASB incident levels in Kings Hedges have increased over the 4 month period to 294 from 232 in the previous period. This is relatively constant with the same period last year. The highest number of incidents were

reported on Arbury Court (38 incidents) and Campkin Road (27) over the 4 month period. Similarly to the previous update, incidents mainly concerned drunken youths or vagrants causing disturbances in these areas.

- Between June and September 2009 there were 15 reports of abandoned vehicles in the ward, compared with 14 during the same period last year. This included 9 vehicles, which were not on site following inspection and four vehicles, which were claimed by their owners. Two cases were also referred to the police for further action. There were no specific hotspots during this period. Minerva Way (3 reports) was a hotspot during the 2008 period.
- Between June and September 2009 there were 129 reports of fly tipping within the ward, compared with 88 during the same period last year. All were removed within 24 hours and there was sufficient evidence to issue one warning letter. In addition, waste transfer documentation was requested from two trade offenders. Minerva Way (16), Arbury Court (14) and Atkins Close (12) were particular hotspots during this period and resulted in one of the requests for waste transfer documentation. In the 2008 period, Northfield Avenue (20), Arbury Court (9) and Minerva Way (5) were the hot spots.
- 25 derelict cycles were dealt with between June and September 2009, compared with 44 during the same period last year. Northfield Avenue (5) and Campkin Road (3) were the hotspots during this period whereas Northfield Avenue (18) and Arbury Court (5) were the hotspots in the same period during 2008.
- Between June and September 2009 18 needles were removed, compared with 0 during the same period the previous year. This included 7 in the Nun's Way Recreation area over three occasions and 8 removed on one occasion at the back of the Arbury Community Centre.
- 17 items of graffiti were removed between June and September 2009 by the City Rangers compared with 1 item the previous year. Arbury Court (7) and Northfield Avenue (5) were the hotspots.

## **West Chesterton**

- Offence levels in West Chesterton have fallen to 261 offences reported from 294 in the previous period and have fallen considerably by comparison with the same period last year which reported 435 offences.
- Dwelling burglary offences in West Chesterton are low with only 15 offences reported over the 4 month period compared to 26 and 34 offences reported in the previous period and the same period last year respectively. These were all relatively spread out across the ward with no notable trends seen in the methods used to commit these offences.
- Robbery offences are low compared to the previous period and to the same period last year.
- Theft from vehicle offences have fallen to 18 offences reported compared to 27 in the previous period. The offences tended to be localised to the area surrounding Chesterton Road and Elizabeth Way. Offenders tended to smash windows to gain entry to the vehicles and often targeted those vehicles with items on display.
- ASB levels have increased from 160 to 188 incidents reported over the 4 month period. This, however, is comparatively lower than during the same period last year which recorded 217 incidents. Chesterton Road and Milton Road recorded the highest level of incidents over the 4 month period with 32 and 29 incidents reported respectively. The nature of the incidents were relatively wide ranging with the main issues relating to rowdy youths congregating and causing disturbances, to drunk and disorderly altercations.
- Between June and September 2009 there were 10 reports of abandoned vehicles in the ward, compared with 17 during the same period last year. This included 2 vehicles, which were not on site following inspection and one case was referred to a housing association for follow-up. A CLE26 notice was also issued to one offender on behalf of the DVLA for not displaying road tax on a public highway and will result in fines issued by the DVLA. Two vehicles were removed and taken to a compound, one has since been claimed following payment of a fine and the other is awaiting collection by its owner. There were no specific hotspots during this period. Hawthorn Way (3 reports) was a hotspot during this period whereas Grasmere Gardens (5 reports) was a hotspot during the 2008 period.

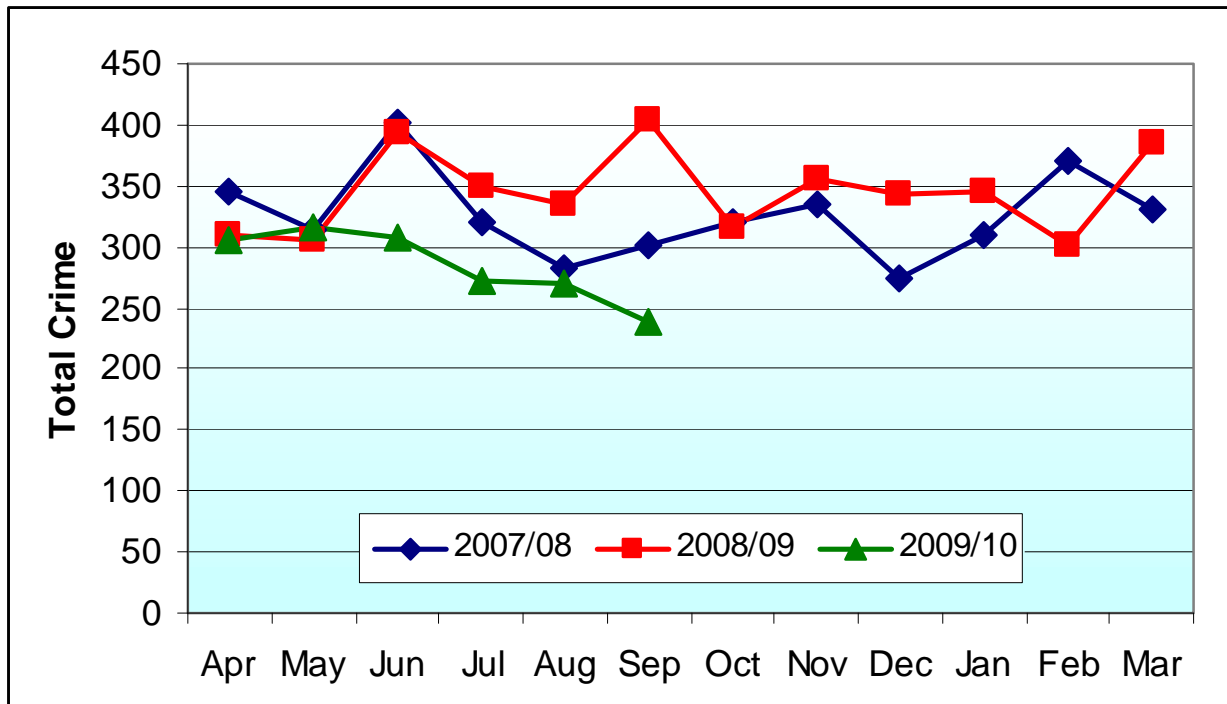
- Between June and September 2009 there were 15 reports of fly tipping within the ward, compared with 11 during the same period last year. All were removed within 24 hours and there was sufficient evidence to issue a verbal and a formal warning. In addition, waste transfer documentation has been requested from two trade offenders. There were no hotspots during both periods.
- 18 derelict cycles were dealt with between June and September 2009, compared with 35 during the same period last year. Chesterton Road (5) and Birch Close (3) were the hotspots during this period whereas in 2008 these were Chesterton Road (6), Milton Road (6) and Victoria Avenue (3).
- Between June and September 2009 no needles were removed, compared with 4 during the same period the previous year.
- Six items of graffiti were removed between June and September 2009 by the City Rangers, compared with 13 during the same period last year. In the 2009 period, Chesterton Road and Victoria Avenue (3 each) were the hotspots, whereas Carlyle Road and Leys Avenue (3 each) were the hotspots during the same period last year.

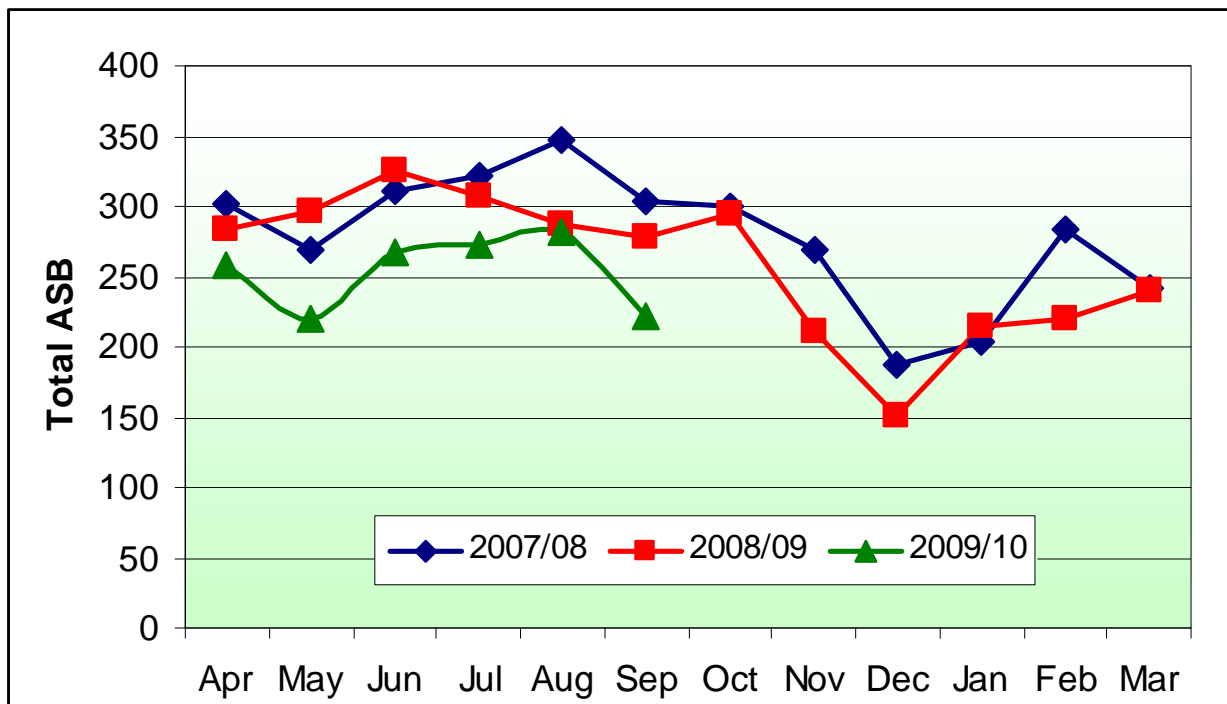
