



**Cambridge City Council's
CCTV System**

Annual Report

1st April 2006 to 31st March 2007

1. INTRODUCTION.

The CCTV system which monitors cameras in Cambridge, Ely and Soham has continued to be very busy over the last 12 months with no let up in assisting the police and other enforcement agencies in the detection and deterrence of crime and provision of evidence, whilst at the same time carrying out its social role in helping to look for missing people or obtaining assistance for people who are unwell or at risk.

A further four infrared cameras have been purchased. These have been sited on Christ's Pieces and Parker's Piece to complete the coverage of the green spaces within Cambridge city centre.

Phase two of the rebuild and upgrade of the CCTV system has been completed on schedule with the introduction of a digital recording system to improve the quality and speed of service we provide to the police and other agencies.

The other innovation introduced this year was a texting service to allow members of the public to contact the CCTV control room with any information they have about crime and anti-social behaviour (this is covered in more detail below).

Our objectives for last year were:

To continue to work towards meeting Cambridge City Council's Medium Term Objectives by providing a high quality CCTV service in Cambridge, Ely and Soham. We will achieve this by:

- Continuing to develop partnership working and in particular develop a successful working partnership with members of the public in Cambridge, Ely and Soham through the new texting service.
- Continue our work with external organisations to improve the national CCTV industry and share 'best practice' across the UK and Northern Ireland.
- Continue the three-year CCTV upgrade programme and convert to a digital recording system by the end of 2006. At the same time the system will expand by accepting additional infrared cameras for green areas and the cameras from the newly built Lion Yard car park.

We believe we have successfully achieved these objectives and we will cover this below.

This report covers the period 1st April 2006 to 31st March 2007.

2. STAFFING ISSUES.

One member of the CCTV staff has left in the last month and we will be recruiting a replacement shortly. The other excellent news is that all the CCTV Supervisors and Operators are to receive individual awards of commendation from the police for their work in assisting Cambridgeshire Constabulary in making Cambridgeshire a safer place. The award ceremony will take place in April 2007. I am delighted that the CCTV staff who actually monitor the cameras and help to make a difference for the people in Cambridge, Ely and Soham have had their valuable work recognised.

We have continued to invest a lot of time in staff training to ensure they have all the necessary skills needed to fulfil their role as CCTV Operators. This has been achieved by staff attending a number of courses or training sessions throughout the year. CCTV technology is rapidly developing into computer based systems and the CCTV staff training this year will concentrate on Information Technology training with all CCTV staff attending a number of courses to prepare them for this onward development in CCTV systems.

3. EQUIPMENT

We have achieved the third objective set for us last year by introducing three significant changes to our equipment this year. These three changes were: the introduction of digital recording, expanding the system to include 17 additional cameras from the annex of Lion Yard car park and the introduction of the texting service.

The digital recording system enables us to record very high quality images from all of our cameras and gather nearly 3 times more images per second per camera than we do at the moment. We will also be able to review the images and provide high quality evidence to enforcement agencies much faster than we have done in the past.

The additional cameras from the annex of Lion Yard car park enable us to extend our coverage of Cambridge's car parks and increase our ability to help in the fight against vehicle crime. The next phase of the Grand Arcade build will see a further set of cameras from Lion Yard's main car park coming into the CCTV control room over the next few months. This will take the number of cameras that we monitor to well over 200.

11. TEXTING SERVICE.

The introduction of the texting service was designed to meet our first objective which was to continue our partnership working and in particular to develop a successful working partnership with the public. We believe that this was the first time that a direct texting service to a CCTV control room had been introduced within the UK. After a great deal of advertising and publicity the texting service was launched on the 1st June 2006.

Initial feedback has indicated that this has been seen in a very positive light by members of the public and businesses in Cambridge, Ely and Soham and by other public bodies across the UK. We have been contacted by a number of police forces and local authorities asking for information and advice on setting up a similar texting service for their own organisations.

In the ten months since it has been running we have received 549 text messages, 230 of which have related to crime or anti-social behaviour issues. This has led to 8 people being arrested and a further 14 receiving cautions, words of advice or fixed penalty notice fines.

4. COMMUNICATIONS.

There have been no major issues with communications. The police 'Airwave' radio system continues to be a great success and the texting service, whilst increasing the flow of information, has not led to a marked increase of the CCTV staff's work load. There are plans in place now to update the retail radio system with a much more reliable radio and this should be rolled out over the next twelve months.

5. CONTACTS WITH THE POLICE.

Communications with all levels of Cambridgeshire Constabulary's Southern Division and Force Headquarters continue to be excellent with the permanent police Liaison Officer making a major contribution to the two-way flow of information.

The CCTV system's cameras observed a total of 4,766 incidents (both crime and non-crime) this year which is up by 207 on last year. This has resulted in the CCTV Control Room contacting the police on 1,969 occasions and the police requesting assistance from CCTV on 2,773 occasions, see Annex 'A' for further details.

6. CRIMINAL ACTIVITY and CRIME FIGURES

It must be stressed that these figures only relate to the area covered by the CCTV cameras. Arrests involving CCTV have again increased this year, this time by 64 to yet another record total of 1,170. These arrests bring our running total since the system started to 7,048.

Increases in arrests involving CCTV have again occurred in relation to Fighting and Assaults, up from 374 to 442. In addition there have been increases in the number of people arrested for Drink Driving, Other Vehicle Offences and Drugs related offences. Some offences have shown a drop, Shop Lifting and Criminal Damage offences have fallen for the second year running. Other categories have stayed at roughly the same levels as last year. The statistics on arrests are shown at Annex 'B'.

784 people received fixed penalty fines or warnings or words of advice from police officers in incidents covered by CCTV Operators this year. The running total is now 5,773. These means that over the period CCTV has been operational it has helped the police take positive action against 12,821 people for criminal or anti-social behaviour activities.

7. REGULATION OF INVESTIGATORY POWERS ACT (RIPA).

Over the last year the CCTV system has assisted in 7 separate RIPA operations, one of which helped towards the police charging 18 people with drugs offences. We are due another visit from the Surveillance Commissioner's Office in April 2007.

8. VIEWING PRIVATE AREAS.

There have been no viewings of private areas during the last twelve months.

9. COMPLAINTS.

There were two complaints about the CCTV system in the last twelve months. Both complaints were from the same person who had been arrested for assault as a result of a report to the police by CCTV. He claimed that CCTV had been responsible for his actions. Careful review of the images of this incident proved that these comments were groundless and his complaint was rejected.

10. RE-DEPLOYABLE CCTV (RCCTV).

Four additional infrared cameras have been purchased through funding by the Safer City Fund and have been installed onto Parker's Piece and Christ's Pieces. This completes our programme of covering the city centre green areas in Cambridge.

Over the last year the RCCTV system has been fully operational. We have received 25 deployment requests (an increase of 150% on last year). 4 requests were rejected for technical reasons but the cameras were deployed to a total of 23 locations. These deployments resulted in the cameras being involved in 324 incidents involved contact with the police and resulted in 70 arrests and the police issuing 26-fixed penalty fines or cautions and words of advice.

11. National Performance Indicators (NPI's).

A set of bi-monthly National Performance Indicators has been established to allow CCTV systems to compare their performance with other Control Centres both regionally (within the area of the Government Offices for the East of England (GOEast) totalling 28 Control Centres) and nationally with a total of 265 Control Centres. The comparison NPI's and Cambridge's ranking against other Control Centres are:

Note: It costs on average £1:33p per hour to run one of our CCTV cameras and the average cost of dealing with each incident is £4.34p.

Although Cambridge's CCTV system appears to be performing very well in comparison with other CCTV Centres both regionally and nationally, these figures should not be accepted as 100% accurate because they rely on all 265 Control Centres entering their statistics accurately and on time. Since this is the first year the NPI's have been used it is reasonable to assume that some work is still to be done to guarantee their accuracy.

12. INFLUENCING EXTERNAL ORGANISATIONS.

Our second objective to: 'Continue our work with external organisations to improve the national CCTV industry and share 'best practice' across the UK and Northern Ireland' has continued over the last year. Cambridge City Council has chaired two national committees on training and development. The first was the CCTV User Group's United Kingdom Skills Group and the second was the Skills for Security, Public Space Surveillance CCTV Sector Consultation Group (SCG) which will look at training and development for all CCTV staff in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

We believe that Cambridge City Council has made a major contribution in helping to focus attention on the need to develop a professional CCTV industry through training and qualifications. Our year as chair of these two groups has now ended but we have now taken up the role of Vice Chairman of the CCTV User Group with special responsibility for training and development in an effort to continue to assist our colleagues in the achievement of a professional CCTV industry and the development and spreading of 'best practice'.

National Occupational Standards (NOS's) are the yardstick by which all training and qualifications for an industry are set. The CCTV industry did not have a set of NOS's. So last year an 'Expert Group' was established to develop a set of NOS's for the CCTV industry. A CCTV Supervisor from Cambridge worked on this group with a number of colleagues from across the country. He made a considerable contribution to the developments of these NOS's, which were formally adopted on 31st January 2007.

13. FUTURE TASKS.

There are a couple of things coming up in the next year which we need to address. First on the 26th July 2007 we will be celebrating the 10th anniversary of CCTV becoming operational in Cambridge. Secondly, on 30th April CCTV will move from the Property and Building Services Section in the Central Services Department to the Parking Services Section in the City Services Department. This is not a physical move of the CCTV system, which will stay where it is and so the change should not have any major effect on CCTV operations, but will mean a change in senior management.

It would be very wrong of us not to acknowledge the major contribution both Margaret Walker, Director of Central Services and John Cowin, Head of Property and Building Services have made towards the success of CCTV in Cambridge. They have both been there from the very start providing high quality management, wise advice and unstinting support for the CCTV system. We thank them for all the hard work they have contributed to CCTV in the last 10 years and wish Margaret a long and happy retirement and John every success in the future.

Our primary objectives will remain the same. We will continue to work towards meeting Cambridge City Council's Medium Term Objectives by helping to make the areas we cover safer places and by providing a high quality CCTV service in Cambridge, Ely and Soham. Our objectives for the next twelve months are to:

- Manage a smooth transfer of CCTV Services from Central Services to City Services without disrupting operational efficiency.
- Continue to improve partnership working and communications with both internal and external partners.
- Continue the three-year CCTV upgrade programme by completing phase three of the replacement of the original Cambridge city centre cameras by March 2008 and expand the system to enable it to accept the new cameras from the newly built Lion Yard car park before the official opening of the car park.
