1. Welcome, housekeeping, introductions and apologies

- 1.1 The Chair, Debbie Kaye, welcomed everyone. It was noted that Dave Baigent was representing Richard Johnson who is replacing Lewis Herbert (Cambridge City Council). There were no attending members of the public.
- 1.2 Apologies were received from Board Members; Dave Bynoe (Bedfordshire, Northamptonshire, Cambridgeshire & Hertfordshire Community Rehabilitation Company Limited (BeNCH CRC Ltd), Claire Richards who is replacing Elisa Meschini (Cambridgeshire County Council) and Members; Adrian Boyle (Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust), Matt Quinn (British Transport Police) and Susie

Talbot (Cambridgeshire County Council Public Health Commissioning).

2. Closed session for CSP Board and Members only

Presentation: Domestic Homicide Review

2.1 Davina James-Hanman, Independent Chair and Author of the Cambridge City Domestic Homicide Review, spoke to the report and recommendations as presented.

2.2 The Chair thanked Davina James-Hanman for her presentation and the Board and Members had the opportunity to ask questions about the report.

2.3 The report with the recommendations would be sent to the Home Office for approval before being published and shared more widely. The CSP will receive six monthly updates and it was noted that the Domestic Homicide Review (DHR) had been funded by the CSP as one of the projects for 2017/18. Action point 07/01

2.4 Carol Davies reported that a county Domestic Homicide Review group has been set up, which includes the County DASV Partnership and Lynda Kilkelly, to ensure the delivery of the recommendations from the county DHRs.

3. The meeting was opened to the public.

3.1 The Chair provided a welcome to the two people joining the meeting, who introduced themselves.

4. Pre-advised questions from the general public

4.1 There were no pre-advised questions.

5. Minutes of 24 April 2018 meeting: Agreement

5.1 The Minutes of 24 April 2018 meeting were agreed and would go forward for publication.

6. Action points: Review

6.1 All Action points from the previous meeting were closed, apart from one which would be discussed at the Officers Support Group meeting following the CSP meeting.

7. Document 1 2018/19 Strategic Assessment: Identifying and responding to vulnerable locations

7.1.1 Leigh Roberts spoke to the strategic assessment and recommendations as presented.

7.1.2 Vice Chair Paul Clarke asked about the correlation between the CSP Priority work and that of the Purple Flag initiative. Leigh Roberts responded that they are using some of the same data and that the proposed Purple Flag is part of a smaller geographical area. She noted that the Greater Cambridge Partnership had shared a geographical map earlier that day, which includes Mitcham's Corner and that the CSP may wish to examine this. Action point 07/02

7.1.3 The Chair asked about how to ensure the co-ordination of all the work in the city such as the Purple Flag initiative and the new Market Ward Group. Priority Lead Officer Steve Kerridge responded that the new Market Ward Group sits as a working group under the CSP Priority: Identifying and responding to vulnerable locations and that Adam Ratcliffe, who is co-leading on the separate Purple Flag initiative, is a member.

- 7.1.4 Dave Baigent asked about the offender profile and the reason for offending such as poverty or feeding a drug habit providing cycle theft as an example. Leigh Roberts responded that some of this work has been researched before and found that the individual offenders are not usually repeat offenders and that organised criminality is usually for higher value goods.
- 7.1.5 The Chair asked about how work would be undertaken in the geographical areas of Parkers Piece and Kelsey Kerridge. Steve Kerridge responded that this can be looked at in a variety of ways and that a larger area would provide a challenge with the ability to differentiate the work. He added that if Mill Road and the city train station are not included that the strategic underpins would not be there and provided the example of the Police and British Transport Police working together on cycle theft.
- 7.1.6 Mark Freeman reported that the Area Committee boundaries and public meetings provided communities with an opportunity to find out what is happening locally and that two way communication is essential.
- 7.1.7 Steve Kerridge provided a further verbal update about the achievements as Lead Officer Priority: Identifying and responding to vulnerable locations and thanked Cambridge City Council's Lynda Kilkelly and his police colleague, Paul Rogerson, for their work in tackling escalating problems quickly.
- 7.2.1 As Lead Officer for the CSP Priority: Safeguarding vulnerable people against violent crime, Steve Kerridge provided a verbal update on the work around county lines, sexual exploitation, labour exploitation and domestic servitude. There have been many successes and the funds from the Proceeds of Crime Act (POCA) will be referred to the Officers Support Group for a partnership bid to be led by Paul Rogerson.
- 7.2.2 Dave Baigent raised the need for better communication by the police with the public such as responding to reports of low level drug dealing. Steve Kerridge replied that he would take this away to look at how information is managed. Action point 07/03
- 7.3.1 Lisa Riddle, Lead Officer for the Priority: Domestic Abuse, provided a verbal update on 3 key areas of the plan. Healthy relationship workshops will be delivered by Centre 33 to secondary schools during 2018/19 and announced the good news that the programme 'Freedom Forever' designed for victims was successful in the Innovate & Cultivate Fund and will be delivered at the Meadows Centre. Members of the CSP were invited to be part of the steering group to have oversight and monitor the programme.
- 7.3.2 Louise Walker as the co-ordinator for the Cambridge City Council White Ribbon Campaign provided a verbal update. The Cambridge City White Ribbon Ambassadors had met recently with David Walmsley in attendance. A successful Abbey People's Community lunch provided the opportunity to engage with the local residents and share the domestic abuse awareness raising campaign along with the live screening of the England and Panama World Cup Football match.
- 8. Annual Review 2018**
- 8.1 Louise Walker spoke to a draft version of the Annual Review 2018, which provides an overview of the work of the partnership, priorities and funded projects. The CSP Board members agreed for it to go forward for publication.

9. Partnership Terms of Reference - agreement

9.1 Louise Walker spoke to the revised Terms of Reference, which lay out the expectations of the Board and Members as a strategic, not an operational, Partnership. The Terms of Reference were agreed by the Board.

10. Cambridgeshire Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Partnership Q1 2018/19

10.1 The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Partnership Quarterly Report was noted.

10.2 Dave Baigent asked about the sharp fall in the marker and Steve Kerridge responded that police system has changed recently and that this would be monitored.

10.3 Paul Clarke asked the diversity data and total number from which there were 19 male referrals, 18 declaring disability and 4 LGBT. Lisa Riddle, Priority Lead Officer, said that she would follow this up with the county DASV Partnership. Action point 07/04

11. DASV Strategic Board DCLG Evaluation

11.1 Lisa Riddle, Lead Officer for the Priority: Domestic Abuse spoke to the report as presented and the recommendations.

11.2. The CSP were asked to provide their responses to four questions regarding support and services, which would be fed back at the county DASV Delivery Board meeting by Lisa Riddle:

- Item 4.1 – Can CSPs or member agencies contribute to any funding to continue outreach work?
- Item 4.8 - how to make best use of the county DASV Partnership materials to target minority groups locally?
- Item 4.5 - are any housing providers applying for the Domestic Abuse Housing Alliance (DAHA) accreditation?
- Item 4.2 - how can domestic abuse services link in with support for those victims with mental health problems once the specialist nurses are no longer in post?

11.3 Louise Walker responded about Item 4.5 that she is on the Cambridge City Council Housing DAHA Steering Group and that Cambridge City Council is working towards DAHA accreditation. Also that the Cambridge Community Forum on Domestic and Sexual Violence/Abuse Forum, which she co-ordinates, invited representatives of Anglia Ruskin University, University of Cambridge and different housing providers to a presentation about DAHA and the accreditation at one of the Forum meetings.

11.4 Kim Masson responded about Item 4.2 that Cambridgeshire and Peterborough NHS Foundation Trust has the triage system 'Prism', which most of the county GP surgeries have signed up for and now have a mental health practitioner available for triage. Carol Davies suggested that it would be useful for G.Ps to be aware of local refuges as there may be potential referrals.

11.5 It was agreed for the questions to be circulated to the CSP and for responses to be sent to Louise Walker for collation. Action point 07/05

12. Update on aligning meetings to Living Well Partnerships LWPs and closer working with South Cambridgeshire Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership

12.1 The Chair provided a verbal update. She is working with Chris Parker (South Cambridgeshire CDRP Chair), Lynda Kilkelly and Suzanne Hemingway to develop a Forward Plan for the meeting agendas and structure a way of working. Cath Mitchell asked to be included on this group, which was agreed.

13. Countywide Strategic Safety Board Verbal Update

13.1 The Chair provided an update about the Countywide Strategic Safety Board meeting, which is being held on 19 July. She asked the CSP to provide comments before the meeting on the key agenda item annual update on the Countywide Community Safety Agreement, which has a clear leadership role for CSPs. With Louise Walker's assistance she has completed a template to share about the work of the Cambridge CSP and our priorities for 2018/19. Action point 07/06

14. Any other business

14.1 Ray Bisby reported that as Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Chief Constable Alec Wood is retiring; the Cambridgeshire Police Commissioner has named his preferred candidate for new Chief Constable. The preferred candidate is Nick Dean, who is currently Deputy Chief Constable for Norfolk Constabulary. In line with statutory procedures, Nick will be interviewed by the Police and Crime Panel at the end of July.

14.2 Regarding an update on the governance of the Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service to be taken over by the Cambridgeshire Police and Crime Commissioner, Ray Bisby reported that there has been a judicial review requested by the Fire Authority against the Government.

14.3 To avoid any misunderstanding over the work of the Purple Flag and the CSP, Adam Ratcliffe explained that the Purple Flag initiative is not trying to replicate work such as of the CSP but to highlight the excellent work being carried out around crime and disorder. Adam Ratcliffe is leading on the Purple Flag initiative with Helen Hames from Cambridge BID.

14.4 Dave Baigent asked about the proposed march in support of English Defence League (EDL) founder Tommy Robinson on Saturday 21 July in Cambridge City and how Pubwatch is being alerted. Steve Kerridge responded that he is the commander on Saturday and that there will also be a counter protest. Adam Ratcliffe, who co-ordinates Pubwatch, said that information had been circulated.

14.5 Paul Clarke reported that Firebreak Youth Intervention Scheme, led by Fire & Rescue Service, which has been presented to the CSP previously, had a successful Passing Out Parade recently. This had been attended by two CSP Board members; Dave Baigent and Lisa Riddle as well as dignitaries such as Heidi Allen MP for South Cambridgeshire. He said that the scheme is reliant on partners funding to be delivered and asked Ray Bisby if there was any update on the PCC's funding following the review. Ray Bisby responded that there was no update yet. Paul Clarke asked if the scheme could be considered for funding from the Proceeds of Crime Act (POCA). It was agreed for this to be considered by the Officers Support Group (OSG).

Action point 07/07

14.6 Mark Freeman asked about the membership of the OSG. Lynda Kilkelly, Chair of the OSG, responded that as the OSG is the working group for the CSP that all CSP members were welcome to attend. Following a question by Cath Mitchell, it was confirmed that Cambridgeshire and Peterborough NHS Foundation Trust were already OSG members and had attended previously.

15. Key messages from the meeting to share with our organisations and the public

15.1 The Chair summarised the key messages to be shared from the meeting:

- The CSP actions from the Domestic Homicide Review to be completed as soon as possible.
- Access to interpretation to improve community engagement is key to all the work we do.

15.2 The Chair thanked the Board and Members for a productive meeting and there being no other business, the meeting was closed at 12:03.
