

#### 1. Introduction

This Neighbourhood Profile for the North area of the city covers the following wards: **Kings Hedges, Arbury, East Chesterton and West Chesterton**. The profiles have been collated by the City Council's Neighbourhood Community Development Team (NCDT) as a tool to developing work plans for the coming year and beyond. The profiles aim to capture key facts and statistics about the area, services that are delivered by the Council and other statutory and voluntary sector partners, key community groups and activities in the area as well as what are perceived to be gaps in provision. Focus groups were held with residents and community groups in each area to identify both positive perceptions of the community as well as identifying issues and gaps from a resident's perspective.

The NCDT has recently realigned its community development resources to work in the areas of highest need in the city. Key themes and issues from the profiling exercise will help to shape the work priorities for the team for the coming year within the resources allocated to each area.

It is envisaged that these profiles will be used by other services within the City Council and other partners as an information resource for working in particular areas of the city









• Two areas within Kings Hedges which fall within the 20% most deprived areas in the country. Which brings together seven different individual indices relating to income; employment; education, skills and training; housing; crime; and living environment.

 Higher than average rates of child poverty in King's Hedges wards where more than a quarter of children are living in poverty.

• As Figure 1 below shows, housing benefit claimants and their dependents are concentrated in particular areas within the City, primarily in the North and East of the City. King's Hedges (21.4%) and Arbury (16.5%) are the wards with the highest levels of housing and/or council tax benefit claimants and their dependents.







## **Sheltered Housing schemes**

Cambridge City Council runs **13 sheltered housing schemes** across the city. Sheltered Housing is predominantly for people aged over 60 who wish to carry on living independently but who require some support in order to do so. The schemes also coordinate a number of activities for and with residents and these are open to the wider community.

Schemes in this area include:

### 4. Community facilities

The City Council mapped community facilities in the city in 2016. The list of facilities in the 4 wards is listed below .There are 36 facilities in total; Four are managed by the City Council and 2 managed by the North Cambridge Community Partnership on behalf of the Council. The rest are made up of independently managed facilities, church halls, school facilities, sports and uniformed group facilities. The remaining two are within blocks of flats managed by City Homes.

As part of the Council's community facilities strategy there are plans to redevelop the Meadows and Buchan Street Community Centres sites to provide a new community facility on one site along with housing provision. 82 Akeman Street will also be redeveloped as part of a housing scheme with retail and community facility provision. All of these plans are subject to planning permission.

Crime Breakdown - Apr 2018-Mar 2019





# Independent living service

Cambridge City Council runs the Independent Living Service, predominantly working with older people age 65+ to support them to maintain their independence into older age. The team runs the provision of Community Alarms to residents across Cambridge. The alarm includes a pendant worn round the neck, as a means to help older people feel safe in their home and to call for urgent help when needed.

As well as providing support for tenants in the City Council run sheltered schemes, the team also offer the Visiting Support service which provides support to people within the city who live in their own home and may need assistance with things including financial inclusion, social isolation, managing correspondence and assistance with home adaptations or moving home.




# 11. Strengths/ assets within the community

Listed below are some of the strengths and assets within the different wards as identified by residents through previous conversations and through recent focus groups including older people and families attending events such as quizzes, holiday lunches and soft play.


- Schools good Ofsted with Chesterton primary and senior both outstanding
- Holiday lunches are well established
- Church involvement in the community
- Good green spaces
- Bus service linking to town, train station and hospital
- Accessible community centres and church halls.
- Arbury Carnival and Chesterton Festival, each held annually
- Shops including supermarkets and post office available
- Access to ATM machines
- Established groups (such as Grovesbury ladies) for local people.

**The Big Listen:** in 2016 some social research was carried out in Kings Hedges and Arbury by a group of local professionals, including council staff and local faith and business leader. "this project aimed at understanding the main issues that concern and matter within North Cambridge". The results reflect the views of people who live in those areas.



Rubbish and litter, people using or dealing drugs and dog fouling are highlighted as the most problematic issues. Moreover, it seems that teenagers/children hanging on the streets, vandalism and people being drunk or rowdy in public places are quite problematic as well. Abandoned or burnt out cars, and food van issues appear to be not a problem at all.



When comparing young people's perceptions with adults' ones, there seems to be no huge difference. The only two issues that can be highlighted are noisy neighborhood and loud parties - young people express this as a problem more than adults - and dog fouling - adults seem to be more bothered than youngsters.

#### 12. Gaps in current provision / key issues

Conversations and questionnaires from local residents in Kings Hedges and Arbury including older people and young families attending events and sessions at local centres have highlighted some issues that local people feel are relevant to the area **Information from West Chesterton to follow** 

• Lack of youth provision and ASB (young people are perceived to be bored with nowhere to go leading to ASB issues for residents)

• Benefits and low wage earners impacted by changes to payments and rules around housing such as bedroom tax.

• Leisure facilities such as swimming pools, cinema's and skating placed elsewhere in the city and are inaccessible / unaffordable for low income families

• Pub closures removed local gathering space for people increasing isolation for some.

• There are no direct bus services linked to west and south west of city.

• Parking issues, especially around schools at drop off and collection times.


• Drug issues. For sale at various points around the area. Some crime relating to drugs. This is based on local knowledge and recent arrests by the police.

• Fly Tipping

• Overgrown gardens especially where lone parents and older people find gardens too much to manage

• Noise, especially in summer when it's warmer and lighter for longer. Issues relate particularly to visiting young language students gathering in open space and local people using outside space more and creating more noise pollution.
